
- For the May 11th meeting, we had 28 members present. This was a business meeting so no guest speaker was present.





Committee Reports:

- A. Membership - Lion Critchfield was awarded the District's Top Membership Chair Person award at the recent District meeting. President Atchley suggested we schedule a "Bring A Friend" day soon. It was also suggested Lion Jerri look into an evening event to "Meet The Sonora Lions" as a recruiting tool.
- B. Club Excellence - Lion Gormely asked for BOD direction regarding future Community service efforts. The Tree Morality and Learn to Read were current efforts. It was suggested the Committee continue to explore possibilities but do not make any commitments.
- C. Glenn Bass Run - Flyers will be published and sent out next week. Coach Bass will send flyers to upcoming area Cross country events. The run is scheduled for Aug 6.
- D. Tree Mortality Project - Lion Tom noted the project name is "Tree Mortality Aid Program." He reported meeting with the Sonora Area Foundation (SAF) and Area 12 Agency For Aging. Lion Gottschall will coordinate efforts w/ loggers, PDG Tom will coordinate fund raising. All funds will be held by the SAF distributed through Area 12, who will determine eligibility of recipients. The Stage 3 production of "Betty's Summer Vacation," June 2 will

be the first fund raiser. A motion (Bader/Skaff) to pay \$95 for grant writing training for PDG Tom was approved. A motion (Bader/Skaff) to include \$5000 for this project in the 2016-17 budget was approved.

WEEKLY PROGRAMS

- At the May 5th meeting, our All Star Football Game player, Jammy Page spoke to the club and outlined his plans for his future education and goals.
- The May 11th meeting was a business meeting, so no guest speaker was scheduled.
- At the May 18th meeting, Jon Rowley was our guest speaker. Mr. Rowley is a hearing specialist from Beltone. He did mention that he thought our song and pledge were great. He reports that vast improvements

have been made over the years as far as hearing aids are concerned. They are no longer the big, bulky devices hovering over and in our ears. A lot of the newer models are barely noticeable and are digitalized. They are designed now to filter and enhance the experience of the wearer, so background noise and static are practically eliminated. There are models of ear pieces that can be wirelessly paired with your cell phone. The need for a hearing aid can be determined by getting what is known as an

audiogram, that lets the specialist know where your hearing problem lies. A lot of people don't get hearing aids because of vanity or fear, but wearing the hearing aids can help prevent auditory atrophy and more loss of hearing. It is true...if you don't use it, you lose it, and the sooner you get the help you need, the better it is for your auditory health. Hearing loss can also affect your brain when left unchecked. Hearing aids come in stereo now. Some hearing aids can pair with your television, so you can fine tune the volume and clarity to suit your own needs, without disturbing other hearing people in the same room.

Cochlear implants are available for qualifying persons. Once you experience hearing loss, it cannot be regained or healed. Most people just learn to adapt to their surroundings with hearing loss. The cost of a hearing aid is approximately \$2500 per hearing aid. Beltone does offer free lifetime care and they are able to help plan which hearing aid might be best for you and your budget. Financing is available through Wells Fargo. Medicare usually does not cover the cost of hearing aids. As a final warning to hearing aid wearers – your pets can and will eat your hearing aids, so do not leave them lying around where they can gain access to them!

- At the May 25th meeting our guest speaker was Jeanne Higgins. She has been with the forest service for over 30 years now, with a degree in Forest Research Management. She is a fifth generation



Californian. For the past year and a half, we have been harvesting timber and managing the reforestation. There was a concern over the density

of the trees that were planted. Right now, the main focus is on restoring the lands destroyed by the Rim fire in 2013. There has been about 220 million board feet from the Rim Fire that has been removed and they are still removing the biomass, trees and burned structures. The spring following the fire, volunteers planted approximately 40,000 trees within that area. This will happen again in the spring. They also gave away trees to landowners who had property destroyed in the fire. Right now, due to the drought and the damage from the fires around the area, there are 20-40 million dead and dying trees. Now the bark beetle problem is a major player in the mortality of some species of pines. Some national forest campground sites will be closed this summer due to the dead trees that could pose a potential safety hazard.


