their doors after the pandemic, they have been delivering 1,155 meals per week for the Meals on Wheels program. Their congregate meals are up to 1,000 meals per month. The main goal of Sierra Senior Providers is to keep the seniors in their homes and keep them active in the community. One of the things that drives Emily is to see our senior population being active. With Meals on Wheels, they always are in need of help and volunteers. Emily has been applying for grants to get another vehicle, and it looks like they might get another 2 vehicles this year! They are updating some of the infrastructure in the kitchen and improve the safety for their drivers and volunteers. The “[Radiothon](#)” event they had last year raised over \$132,000 for the Senior Center. They are creating new activities at the center such as line dancing and a senior fitness class will begin in March. They are struggling with a few security issues lately from the homeless and one helper had an unfortunate encounter with a large dog. There has even been a fire and the local police has needed to be called a few times. They are hosting a fundraiser later in February called :Let LOVE Shine, to be held at the Black Oak Casino.

There will be busses available to pick you up at the Senior Center and take you there for the event. They center hosts a free Veterans Breakfast on the first Thursday of every month. The Lions Club provides donuts for this breakfast also. This is to thank the Veterans in our area for all their sacrifices they have made for our country. They are trying to expand their congregate dining to an area in Columbia. They have to apply with Area 12 to do that, and they can no longer have it in Jamestown. They are expanding the areas for delivery for the Meals on Wheels program also.

Did you know that if you are a Veteran or use Veteran benefits (i.e. ChampVA), that if you visit an emergency room, you MUST notify the VA of that visit within 72 hours, otherwise they may not pay for your ER visit? This has been a rule of theirs for about six years now (or maybe longer). The number to call for your ER visit is 1-844-724-7842. A few other benefits in our area are audiology and optometry services. You no longer need a consult/referral for Optometry or Audiology appointments. You can call and schedule those appointments directly. For Audiology, call 916-843-7456. For Optometry call 916-366-5463. Guest Speaker: Our guest speaker today was Nancy Scott from [Nancy's Hope](#). Most of you know her from the Thrift Store, now located on Stockton St. near the fairgrounds. Nancy admitted she went early on to the Toastmasters to perfect her public speaking, so had a special connection for her when hearing about how they help our student speakers for the Student Speakers Contest we host.

Nancy's Hope is so much more than just the thrift store, however. They have many, many programs and services available for the people in our community such as their Back-to-School program, supplying backpacks for students ~ Blanket and coat giveaways, a clothing program—



for just a \$5 donation you can receive \$30 worth of clothes ~ Dress for Success program ~ and a food pantry. Please visit their website to get the full scope of what they do and why. The pandemic changed the way Nancy's Hope serves the community with food, clothing, games, etc. Prior to Covid, they served about 400 folks monthly; post Covid it is closer to 800-1100 per month. Frequently, they run out of food. Recently they had a fundraiser that raised \$17K for them. They were able to pick up pallets of goods from Save Mart, Safeway, and other businesses around town.. They have a Fresh Start program for folks to help out if they lose their belongings, such as being sold from a storage unit. This is a one-time only service and the recipient must show proof of loss. They have a Heart 2 Hand program for unsheltered folks and have started doing a new trash program, giving incentives for the unsheltered to not leave their trash behind. They have partnered with Resiliency Village and the health dept.



to develop an outreach program and are educating the homeless to live where they're not going to lose their stuff. There are services where the homeless can get care for their animals, haircuts, and even pedicures. There is a Mommy-to-Be program that helps ladies who are having babies and they have Christmas help where they provide presents and stockings for kids. They also host fun events for whole families, such as a family skate day and they encourage families to come and have fun instead of sit around their wireless devices and gaze at a screen all day. It encourages family bonding. Recently, the Nancy's Hope Thrift store was vandalized and incurred thousands of dollars in broken windows, etc. The good news was that [Banks Glass](#) will be replacing the windows at cost. Gotta love this community!

It is with great sadness that we say goodbye to our good friend and companion, John Moyer. He passed away early Wednesday morning, February 15, 2023. John and Ruth first blessed our club by attending a meeting in June 2015 and were inducted into our club in early August. We immediately saw great value in their membership and sought to include them in as many ways as possible. John soon was appointed as Tail Twister and had a delightful, funny way of collecting fines from everyone so it wasn't so painful. In 2017, John took over the duties of club newsletter editor and morphed it into the excellent publication that it is today. John received a Presidential Appreciation plaque for all his hard work, including but not limited to most of the photography for the club, as well as co-chairing the Read To Succeed Program with Ruth, which was one of his favorite programs. For John, having been an educator previously at Summerville, this program held a special place in his heart. John also received a Harry Carlson Fellowship in 2020. In early 2021, John and Ruth relocated to the west coast of California to live with family and settle into a comfortable nest being well taken care of by his son Brian and his wife, Tracy. John had been struggling for years with some serious medical problems, and by this time, the cancer was starting to take its toll. John succumbed to this awful disease after a long battle and a short stay in Hospice. He was 82 years old (1940-2023). John truly touched a lot of our lives. Here are a few testimonies to that fact.

Lion Jerri told us that there will be a celebration of life for him in the summer in Rawlings, Wyoming. **Tail Twister:** The Secret Lion this week was Lion Jan, who managed to have Lions Phil and Jim fined for not greeting her properly. Lion Phil protested the fine but paid anyway.

She thinks maybe she should have gotten her degree in Etymology because she loves it so much ~ Lion Ray told a story from his days working in the jail and a former prisoner. The prisoner was in for grand theft auto. He was about to be paroled and was told he would have to have a job before he was released. He said he did...selling high end yachts! Guest Speaker: Guest speaker, Deputy Jarrod Pippin, from the Sheriff's office, apologized for Sheriff Pooley not being able to attend but sent him in his stead to talk about the [CCW program](#) (Concealed Weapons). In the state of California, the Sheriff's offices are the designee to issue permits. There are three requirements to obtaining a concealed carry permit: You need to be a resident with some permanency in the county, you must be 21 years of age, and you must be of good moral character. If you think you qualify, you can submit an application online. There is a \$20 payment for the application. There is a screening pro-

after that. If you pass that process, you are brought in for an interview. They will ask questions to clarify any questions. You will be required to take an 8-hour course on firearm safety. You will be fingerprinted, then the background process is finalized, and then you receive your permit. There may be other fees involved, like for fingerprinting, the background checks, and the firearm safety course. There used to be a rule that you had to show cause for carrying a concealed weapon, but that was shot down by the State Supreme Court. Tuolumne County is a pro-CCW county and they believe the process should be easier for law-abiding folks to get one. There are about 1,500 permits issued in our county. The new process started while Sheriff Melee was in office and still continues. The information on the folks with permits are kept internally and with the Dept. of Justice, plus you get an ID card. You have to own a legally registered (to you) firearm to get a CCW permit. The Sheriff's office does to follow-up checks on some folks, and yes, there are many who do not adhere to the rules. You can generally open carry on forest lands without a permit, but that's a gray area of the law. If you get pulled over by a law enforcement officer, it is a good practice to inform that officer you are carrying. If asked, you must show your permit. Your permit is good in the State of California, and some other states may recognize it also. It would help to check the jurisdictional area you may travel to first for their rules. You should learn the proper way to transport guns and ammo, when you need to lock them up and keep them separate, and when you don't. If you have unregistered guns, the DOJ has a way for you to update the info on those guns and get them registered. You can do this online.





Design your own LiOmelet, leftovers...anything goes. Just don't exceed 3 oz. of ingredients as the omelet will tear.

Hint: Butter cooks at the same temperature as eggs. Slow melt or too hot = browning. Foam = just right eggs. Enjoy a buttery foam and it will set perfect and stay wonderful to the taste.


