Columbia College Scholarships 2023

The Sonora Lions Club is proud to announce the winners of the 2023 Sonora Lions Columbia College Scholarships. Every year the Sonora Lions Club awards six scholarships to deserving students based on the following criteria: The applicant must be enrolled in at least 9 units in the previous and current term, maintain a GPA of 2.5 or greater (depending on the scholarship), plan to return to Columbia College or a 4-year institution, and major in Political Science, Education, Educational Counseling, Law Enforcement, Law, Business, Entrepreneurship, or be enrolled in one of the vocational programs. Special attention will be given to older or returning students with special circumstances, veterans, leadership, volunteerism, and their work experience. Financial need must be demonstrated. It never is an easy decision to make who gets a scholarship, so after many hours of reading, discerning, and discussion, here are our choices.

Judge Ross A. Carkeet Sr., Memorial Scholarship—\$800

This year the Judge Carkeet scholarship will be awarded to Brittany Stratton. Ms. Stratton's professional references give her high marks for her academic aptitude and personality to succeed in her professional goal of becoming a small business attorney. They say that she excels in all of her classes. She has or is currently taking Financial Accounting, Micro and Macro Economics, Entrepreneurship, Contracts Law, and Business Law, to name a few. She currently has a class load of 13 units and holds a 3.54 GPA. Brittany says that she wishes to become a lawyer and be able to show her future children that you can do anything if you work hard enough!

Les Coon Memorial Scholarship—\$800

The Sonora Lions Club has chosen Tara Soderberg as the 2023 Les Coon Scholarship recipient. Ms. Soderberg qualifies as an older (40) student who survives on a most limited income. Tara represents the school and the community alike with multiple jobs, club involvement, all while maintaining a very strong 3.89 GPA with over 78 units.. She is going into Child Development and has two of the strongest professional references in the lot of candidates. She has a very revealing personal story and her future is very bright.

Vernon McDonald Memorial Scholarship—\$800

This year's Vernon McDonald Scholarship will go to Cheralyn Montuy. Cheralyn qualifies in every area stated. She is a 30-year-old mother of 3 who lives independently on a very sub-par income. She maintains a perfect 4.0 GPA in her college work, heading toward becoming a nurse. She has extraordinarily strong references from two of her professors. She works multiple jobs and is involved in community life as well as school. Her personal story is very compelling and scored the highest of all the candidates.



Bill Dunlavy Memorial Scholarship—\$1,000

This year the Sonora Lions Club has selected China Young as the winner of the Bill Dunlavy Scholarship. Ms. Young is very enthusiastic and dedicated to getting her degree in Child Development and Elementary Teaching. Her most recent and current classes include Principles/Practices of Teaching, Math for Elementary Teachers, Health, Nutrition and Safety, Communication with the Deaf, Literature and Education Field Experience, to name a few, all while maintaining a GPA of 4.0 with a current class load of 16 units! China's references say that her drive for success is strong and that she will do well in her pursuits. She grew up with very little parental support and she is supportive of her peers with her positive, enthusiastic, and helpful nature. China is also an active member of the Child Development/Future Educators Club on campus.

Dr. Harvey "Dusty" Rhodes Memorial Scholarship—\$600

The winner of the Dusty Rhodes Scholarship this year is Joshua Christie. He is an individual whose area of learning is education, counseling, and bioscience. Our recipient, who currently maintains a 3.9 GPA, has 31 completed units and is an over-30-year-old man with 4 dependent children. Mr. Christie was raised in a single-parent home (disabled), and his life's path, admittedly, was not an easy one, having dropped out of high school with a "chip on his shoulder." After a brush with the law and the birth of his son with a debilitating disease, his path changed and he was determined to accomplish a career path with education. He is now majoring in the field of education with an aim to becoming a grief counselor or drug counselor. Per Joshua, "I plan to give just as much of my dedication and perseverance to my education as I was willing to commit to the life that got me here."

Felix Romo Memorial Scholarship—\$600

Murdith Bright is our selected winner of the Felix Romo Scholarship this year. Ms. Bright is a highly motivated student with a 4.0 GPA thus far. She is currently taking many challenging classes and 13 units that pertain to her major of Entrepreneurship as well as Project Management, Conflict Management, and others. She is also a single mother of 2, struggling to make ends meet. Her professional references recounted her enthusiastic and dedicated desire to succeed in her current and future education and entrepreneurial business goals. Murdith herself proclaims to be a proud student of Columbia College and is honored to have the opportunity to create a better future for herself and her family.

TUOLUMNE COUNTY VOLUNTEER FAIR 03-30-2023

This year's Tuolumne County Volunteer Fair was a big success. There were over 70 volunteer groups that signed up to be represented at the fair this year. The Sonora Lions Club came with a slightly different approach to get people to come to our table and talk with us. We had our Wheel of Fortune on the table and enticed folks to come and spin and win a prize. We had personalized Sonora Lions Club pens, flag lapel pins, flags on a stick, a chomping wind-up lion, and a bottle of bubbles. While the people lined up to spin our wheel, that gave us a chance to talk to them and let them know who Lions are and what we do. We had our Club Info cards and brochures out for all to see and take, plus a master list of our projects and programs. There were cards that people could fill out if they wanted more information on Lions, and we ended up with 38 cards filled out! Hopefully this event will garner a few folks who are likeminded giving people like us and pique their interest enough to come to a meeting.



APRIL 5TH MEETING

Pres. Tim opened our meeting in the usual fashion. Our guest speaker, Michael Roberson, was introduced and the Welcome Song was sung. Joining us later on was Shannen Hubbard, a friend of Lion Jerri's. Committee Reports: Sunshine—Lions Bud and Jerri attended the Celebration of Life for PDG Gene Weatherby over the weekend. Volunteer Fair—we had 38 guests sign up to receive more information on the Lions Club and many of them expressed an interest in attending/joining the

Lions. Cioppino Dinner—\$11,737 was collected with more funds to still come in. There was \$5,148 in expenses leaving a profit of around \$6,500. There were 162 tickets collected for serving meals there, but 175 meals total were



given (including take-out and Boy Scout workers). Our own Lion Cat Reuter won the door prize, a \$200 gift card to Seven Sisters Restaurant at the casino. The sign - up page for the serving breakfast at the convention was sent around. **Tail Twister:** Lion John Nolen was standing in as Tail Twister. If you didn't have your membership card handy, you had to pay a fine. The Secret Lion today was Lion Bud, but since everyone shook his hand, everyone had to pay. Happy Bucks: Lion Paul had a Happy Buck because he is now back at



work at the dealership and sold 5 cars right off the bat! ~ Lion Tim thought the Cioppino dinner went very well and all the guests he talked to about it had glowing reports. He thanked everyone for their help. The first reading of the Slate of Officers for

2023-24 was read by Lion Wendy. Cash Raffles: Lions Jerry and Jill won the cash raffles. Fine-Free Critter: The Fine-Free Critter was won by Lion Paul. Black Marble Draw: Lion Bud won the chance to draw for the black marble, but only found a white one. The pot continues to grow.

Guest Speaker—Michael Roberson, the Homeless Services Coordinator of Tuolumne County was our guest speaker today. One of his biggest challenges is how to protect the health and wellness of the entire community as well as the homeless community. Senior citizens is the largest at-risk population, followed by the youths (18-25 y/o). He started over a year ago and was told to get to it! His boss is County Administrator, Tracie Riggs. She is clear on what she expects from everyone. To date, Michael has housed exactly 0 people. He never intended to be a front-line social worker. One of the main problems of fixing the homelessness in any area is not getting the money. They can get the funds to get it started, but keeping the project going

and maintaining the program is a whole other issue. He has connected with Mariposa county to work on this. He compared trying to get the homeless into homes is like a game of "musical chairs." The competition is fierce and it is extremely difficult for a homeless person to compete with professionals and business persons, etc. There is a "Navigation Center" available now for people to go through to see what they can qualify for as far as help. The aim for this center is to help people become more self-reliant and self-sufficient. There have been many who have gone on to being totally independent without any assistance from the government at this point.

Mental illness is a huge part of the homeless problem. It can often start as a part of your living conditions. Also, 70% have developed mental illness after becoming homeless. It can start with mild depression, leading to stress/anxiety, then alcohol and drugs. Not many are immune to the possibilities given the right circumstances. Tuolumne County runs 3 supportive homes for people with mental illness. They are striving to bring a balance to those person's lives. About 15% of our homeless are Veterans. It would make more sense to give these homeless people what they really need...not what you think they need.

The homeless services have only been a part of Tuolumne County since 2018. Social workers are being mandated to be housing managers now. It is Michael's job to take that problem off the social workers' shoulders. Housing choice voucher systems have taken the place of Section 8 housing. There is an incentive placement payment, creating housing opportunity for the homeless. However, even the best vetting does not guarantee a great tenant nor does a great credit score. Sometimes they just need more help than just being placed in a home—they might need supervision and

supportive places. The program also partners with Mother Lode Job Training Services. There is a "shared housing" program where the government buys a house, puts 6 people in it to share, having each person sign a lease for room space. Rules and sup-



port are all managed. They have 3 of these such homes so far. All the money goes into a trust fund.

All in all, homelessness is detrimental to the entire community. Everyone cares, but there is the NIMBY syndrome, nobody wants it in their back yard. Apartment complexes will not work. If you are in the social support system, they will do just about anything to help you succeed. The troublemakers and rowdy crowd problem will never be solved without housing and the public will probably never be totally supportive of homeless initiatives. We need to find a way to make this a win-win situation for all.

News for Veterans and Their Families

There exists a little known financial resource for veterans and their families, the VA Aid and Attendance Benefit. This is for veterans and their surviving spouses. It applies to individuals who require the regular attendance of another person to assist in bathing, dressing, and meal preparation, medication monitoring, or other activities of daily living. This benefit is also available to individuals who reside in assisted living communities, residential care home, skilled nursing facilities, and those receiving personal in-home care. You must meet the qualifications and provide proof of need. 
HARVEY "DUSTY" RHODES' CIOPPINO DINNER FUNDRAISER

INTERNET USE FOR A VIP





walked into the Senior Center today and heard sounds coming from the main dining room—referring to his hen recording story told earlier.

Guest Speaker: Our guest speaker, Mark Dyken, from Resiliency Village, came to speak about the homelessness situation in our county, and the services that Resiliency Village has to offer its residents. Where do you go if you don't have a home, especially in this horrible weather we've been experiencing lately? RV started about 4 years ago and has been housing people there for about 18 months now, having provided 5,200 shelter night beds. Mark started as a school Foster Liaison, working with homeless children, and knows first hand how difficult the struggle is. A lot of present-day homelessness stems from trauma experienced in childhood. Each trauma increases your risk. Their aim at RV is to help the citizens become selfsustaining, because no one actually WANTS to end up homeless. Poverty charges interest, especially on your health. Almost 100% of women in the program have experienced domestic violence, sexual abuse, or childhood abuse, and 30% of the homeless people are children. If you want to change the homeless problem, you need to deal with the children first. Through love and patience, you can heal those traumas, but there is no "magic switch" you can turn on or off to end the situation. Tuolumne County has a higher percentage of homeless per capita; even higher than cities like NYC, LA, Washington DC, and SF. It is not safe to be homeless and the impact is heavy on our safety, schools, businesses, law enforcement, hospitals, and service providers. There is also the human loss potential involved. When people have housing, sometimes it is easier for them to give up those vices



that drag them down. It gives them dignity and the ability to foster new, healthier relationships. Chicken Ranch has been a huge help in maintaining this program. All those housed at

RV are employed, save for those who are seniors on disability and a mother of a 1-year-old baby. All residents must go through an intake interview, and the main source of funding at RV is fundraisers and grants. They will be able to house up to 32 persons at some point in the future. Currently they have 2 paid staff members.

She taught women's health to those young girls between the ages of 14-19 years. The girls changed so much. They found purpose and worth because of the program. She will be going back in 2 weeks and doing more health classes to give them more specific and basic medical knowledge for taking care of themselves. There will be a preschool class set up

will be a preschool class set up for 2-year-olds and up. In Uganda, girls are treated less than boys. Life for a girl was very dangerous before entering the center. Georgia will be teaching and is currently taking Greek and its culture. Her daughter will travel with her and also will helping to teach the class on Greece. The will also make Greek cookies and hope to expand the minds of these girls about the world that surrounds them. Most of their graduates will go back to their hometowns and set up a tailoring or hair dressing business. The students are learning English and Georgia works with them through an interpreter for the ones who do not speak English.

There are areas in Uganda that have a lot of unrest, but where they are there is absolutely no problem. Finances are through donations and grants. She feels that helping with their immediate needs is just a small patch, but she wants to teach them to survive an thrive. Georgia wants to teach them common knowledge things that we all take for granted. Some really don't even know the basics that we all grew up with.



A GEOGRAPHY LESSON

How The Great Lakes Were Formed

During the last Ice Age, the mile-thick Laurentide ice sheet covered most of Canada and the northern contiguous United States. The massive weight and movement of this glacier gouged



out the earth to form the lake basins. About 20,000 years ago, the climate warmed and the ice sheet retreated. Water from the melting glacier filled the basins, forming the Great lakes. Approximately 3,000 years ago, the Great Lakes reached their present shapes and sizes. Today, the Great Lakes ecoregion contains a variety of habitats, including aquatic, forest, marsh, wetland, and dune ecosystems. Widely varying climate, soils, and topography support more than 3,500 species of plants and animals.
