



Hello Lions and Friends,

The number of Lions in 4-A1 and the number of clubs in the District have fallen drastically during the past 30 years that this District has supported California Lions Camp, Camp Pacifica.

During the past year, the Camp has weathered a major wind storm, nearby fires and smoke damage, closure due to the pandemic, and a series of lawsuits from a former Lion who worked as a contractor/volunteer at the Camp. On top of those problems, financial support for the Camp has dropped and the ability to obtain insurance has disappeared. The result was a decision to put the Camp on the market with the hopes that a buyer could be found and a sales agreement reached that would allow the Camp to retain two or three weeks each year for Camp Pacifica at the facility. If not, the sale would provide funding to rent a facility each year for the Camp.

CAMP PACIFICA—the experience—will not die. This year, there will be five exploratory trips to cultural sites for the youngsters, with the hope of a three-day overnight camping experience at a rented campground at the end of the summer.

The California Lions Camp, Camp Pacifica did not enter into this decision to sell lightly. All of the possible solutions



were studied and discussed. The financial problems did not appear overnight and have been there for a decade or so. It was the other pressures—fire, storm, insurance, lawsuit—that forced this

decision. In the long run, it is believed that it is the best decision for Lions and our disabled children.








COMING SOON TO A TOWN NEAR YOU!
